
around 20 years and also has experience working at St. Bernard Catholic Elementary School.

The event has been going on at the school for over 15 years and has raised well over \$100,000.



"It's great," said Corio. "We get to run for charity. We all know people who have died from cancer so it's great to be able to run for them."

"I'm honored to run because I know a lot of people who have died of cancer," added Barbarossa.

Barbarossa thought the Terry Fox Run was a great thing for the school to be doing.

"If we can help find a cure for cancer, then it's a good idea," she said.

Large schools were linked with small; rural with urban; northern with south-


Each class chose the theme and form of its Books of Life, which were exchanged with its matched school.

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St. Anthony School students honour Terry Fox legacy

Students of St. Anthony Catholic Elementary School in Harrow honoured the legacy of Terry Fox last week during their annual walk and fundraiser in support of the local chapter of the Canadian Cancer Society.

On Friday, September 28, staff and students from JK to grade 8 participated in the event, walking around the school and into town carrying posters and banners proclaiming "We Are Terry Fox." The school has been hosting the Terry Fox Walk for a number of years under the leadership of teacher, Beth Marontate. According to St. Anthony School principal, Carl Bull, the students were successful in

raising more funds than last year, coming in around \$200.

"The kids are always very committed to this fundraiser and Mrs. Marontate does an incredible job motivating them and putting this whole thing together," said Bull.

In July of 1980, after having one leg amputated due to cancer, Terry Fox embarked on his Marathon of Hope across Canada, starting in St. John's, Newfoundland. With the goal of raising \$24 million for cancer research, one dollar for every Canadian citizen, Fox ran the equivalent of a full marathon every day. One hundred and forty-three days into his journey, Fox was forced to end his run just outside of Thunder Bay when the

cancer spread to his lungs.

"It's important for the students to have knowledge of Canadian heroes and appreciate the legacies they leave behind...they learn that a legacy is something that endures and that any one person can do great things and leave a legacy behind."

Prior to taking off on their walk, Bull addressed the students and showed a short video highlighting Terry Fox's journey. He explained that Fox was an average man just like everyone else who chose to do incredible things with his life.


"We're all average people, just like Terry Fox and we all have the opportunity to do great things."

Documenting the event every step of the way on Friday were members of the school's newly formed Media Club, made up of students from grades 5 to 8. New to the school this year, the students will have the opportunity to develop electronic content for the school's newly launched blog, conduct interviews with staff and students about things going on around the school, and much more.

Armed with their new Apple iPads, groups of students set out on Friday, filming the Terry Fox Walk - the first official assignment for members of the Media

"Everyone will take turns contributing content to the blog," said Bull. "Through this we're hoping that they'll learn some really neat technical skills as well as leadership skills."
