For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology is a world-class international high school robotics competition.

Each year about 3,000 high school teams comprised of 30 high school students dedicate several hours every day after school to build mansized robots that compete in worldwide regional competitions

that lead up to the world championships, where 20,000 participants and spectators pack the Edward Jones Dome in St. Louis.

Students who participate in FIRST are twice as likely to go on to university and college, twice as likely to major in STEM (science, technology, engineering, mathematics) and 10 times as likely to take part in a co-op/ internship during post-secondary.

Students who participate in FIRST are also eligible for \$16 million worth of scholarships at universities and colleges in North America.

2014 at UWindsor

Plans are underway to host a regional FIRST Robotics tournament at the University of Windsor in 2014, which will attract thousands of high school students from Ontario, Michigan, Ohio, Indiana, and as far away as California, Germany, and Brazil.
