# Legacy Trees take root at local schools





St. Anthony Catholic Elementary School's 7B class is taking on a new fundraising initiative to support WE Walk for Water.

Walk for Water is an initiative that teaches people, schools and businesses around the world about water, and its shortages, around the world.

WE Charity is an inter-

national charity and educational partner. The organization operates collaborative programs both domestically and internationally.

Access to clean water can mean the difference between life and death. Since 1990, 2.6 billion people have gained access to improved drinking water sources, but there is still work to be done to improve the livelihood of the 663 million people without access to safe drinking water.

In developing communities, women and girls have the primary responsibility of collecting water from distant sources. This means they often miss out on school and income-generating activities at home while hauling water for themselves and their families.

With access to clean water, families are able to have their girls attend school, watch their crops flourish at home and improve their personal health. Children are especially at risk for water-related diseases, and with better access to clean water school attendance rates increase—expanding the opportunities in children's lives.

With WE Walk for Water, every \$25 will guarantee someone clean water for life. St. Anthony Catholic Elementary School is hoping to raise \$500 to support the cause. They kicked off their fundraising campaign on Wednesday, May 9, with a Walk for Water at their school.

The school kids were challenged to carry a whole bucket of water around the school yard, a feat that proved difficult. But this is a task that is taken on by children around the world for hours a day, preventing them from achieving their goals.

The students will be collecting money from the popcorn sales held at the school, as well as Friday's Loonie for Licence fundraiser. They




