Engaging Our Future: 2013 – A Year in Review

The Strategic Plan of the Windsor-Essex Catholic District School Board is built upon the two fundamental pillars of Student Achievement and Faith Development. The highlights listed below reflect a focused and collaborative commitment to excellence.

Faith Development

✓ The Catholic Character Development Initiative themed "Our Journey to Holiness" continued to be the highlight of our academic year. A student who exemplified the following virtues within their grade category was presented with the award for:

Grades JK – 3: Goodness Kindness, Belonging, Gratitude and Faithfulness; Grades 4 – 6: Compassion, Respect and Knowledge;

Grades 7 and 8: Wisdom and Courage;

Grades 9 and 10: Integrity and Discipleship;

Grades 11 and 12: Humility and Justice.

- Continued the development of the Equity and Inclusion Policy as well as the formation of Social Justice and Equity Clubs within our High Schools.
- Undertook a Faith Development Review Initiative in conjunction with Assumption University and the Windsor and Essex Deaneries.

School Board Profile

The Windsor-Essex Catholic District School Board operates **38 elementary schools** and **8 secondary schools**, as well as an alternative and an adult education program, that provide quality Catholic education to over **24,250 students**. The Board employs **1261 full time equivalent elementary and secondary teachers**, as well as **847 support staff**. Support staff includes principals, vice-principals, educational assistants, child and youth workers, early childhood educators, IT technicians, school office support, custodial and maintenance staff, as well as board office administration and other professional staff.





Student Achievement Success in Windsor-Essex Catholic DSB

The results from the administration of the 2013 Assessments of Reading, Writing and Mathematics: Primary and Junior Divisions, the Grade 9 Assessment of Mathematics and the Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test indicate that the students of WECDSB are becoming more proficient in their literacy and numeracy skills and are amongst the most successful students in our region.

Assessment of Reading, Writing and Mathematics: Primary and Junior Divisions


In the Primary division, the percentage of students achieving the provincial standard increased by 3% in Reading, 3% in Writing and 2% in Mathematics. In the Junior division, there was an increase of 1% in Reading, 4% in Writing and a decrease of 1% in Mathematics. Students in the WECDSB met or exceeded the provincial average in five of the six areas.






Grade 9 Assessment of Mathematics

Students enrolled in the Grade 9 academic course who achieved a provincial standard increased by 4% and students enrolled in the Grade 9 applied course who achieved the provincial standard increased by 9%. Students in the WECDSB exceeded the provincial average by 2% in the academic course and by 10% in the applied course.






Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test (OSSLT)

The success rate for first-time eligible (fully participating) students who wrote the OSSLT was 87%, which is a 1% increase from the previous year. This is the highest success rate for WECDSB first-time eligible (fully participating) students over the past five years. WECDSB exceeded the OSSLT provincial success rate by 5%.

Student Senate

The 2012-2013 school year was significant for the Student Senate as they attended the Ontario Catholic Student Leadership Conference that was held in April in Ottawa. Trustees Najem and Ellepola also coordinated the Student Senate and worked to serve as co-hosts of this Provincial event. In 2013-2014 Catholic Student Trustees elected were Madeline Ellepola and Francis Dellosa who attend F.J. Brennan Catholic High School and Assumption Catholic High School, respectively. This year these Trustees are hard at work leading the Senate in organizing community outreach initiatives such as toiletry and blanket drives for student participation in our high schools. They have successfully organized and held their Student Senate Faith Day event that invited student councils from all of our high schools to come together for a day of faith and fun. Future projects will see a Province Wide Mass taking place on May 7 and student involvement in the 'Speak-Up in a Box' initiative. In May 2013, Student Trustee Madeline Ellepola was elected President of the Catholic Board Council of the Ontario Student Trustees Association for a 1 year term.








2012-2013 Highlights

With a focus on student achievement, faith formation, and stewardship of resources, the Board successfully ended the 2012-2013 fiscal year with an in-year surplus of \$7.68M, which was \$10.0M better than budget. This was achieved through a significant reduction in ongoing expenditures, including post-retirement benefits for those over the age of 65, as required by legislation. The financial results contributed to the elimination of the Board's \$2.3M

accumulated deficit in 2012-2013, resulting in an accumulated surplus of \$5.4M one year ahead of plan.

The expenditure charts above highlight how the Board allocated its resources in 2012-2013 to have the greatest impact on the classroom. Also shown is a chart depicting sources of revenue that were used to finance these expenditures.

A 2013-2014 Budget to Support Student Success

The budget is the Board's fiscal plan that supports the delivery of educational programs and services and is key to its long-term sustainability. Building on the previous year of solid fiscal management, the Board passed a balanced budget of \$244.5M for the 2013-2014 school year. This budget features a modest in-year surplus of \$1.3M.

The approved budget was the product of extensive community consultation undertaken by the Supervisor of the Board, with a focus on providing the system with the financial, human and capital resources necessary to ensure continued student success and faith formation.

Arriving at this balanced position has not been without its challenges. The effects of declining student enrolment present ongoing funding pressures for the Board, as grants from the Ministry of Education are largely tied to enrolment. These

pressures, combined with the Board's commitment to eliminate its capital deficit, put a strain on the operating budget and facility utilization.

Despite these challenges, the Board's most recent financial forecast prepared in December 2013 presents an even more positive financial outlook for the Board. Additional savings are forecast, demonstrating the Board's commitment to fiscal responsibility while maintaining system-wide stability that does not compromise student achievement.

Note: Information presented in this section does not include adjustments for differences between the Ontario education funding model and Canadian generally accepted accounting principles for local government established by the Public Sector Accounting Board.
