St. Anthony School Celebrates New School Year

St. Anthony Catholic School in Harrow started the new year off on a high note two weeks ago with great enrollment numbers and beautification efforts.

School Principal, Carl Bull, said that around 19 new students of all grade levels registered with the school since June and a new kindergarten teacher will be added to the team to accommodate the school's youngest learners. Two hundred and seventeen students in total are enrolled at the school.

Members of the school's Parent Council have also been working hard in partnership with the school for some outdoor beautification efforts which saw new trees, shrubs and flowers planted along with the laying of fresh mulch. Bull said that the school has received a lot of compliments regarding the work that has been done.

"It looks gorgeous and the parents really like it," said Bull. "We've had some great feedback and we're grateful to the parent council for all of the work they put into it."

One area of focus that Bull said staff and students are excited about at St. Anthony's is a new Digital Learning Team which was launched at the end of last year. That initiative is continuing this year and provides students from grades 6 to 8 the opportunity to assist with the school's social media websites, blogs, photography and announcements.

The school's robotics team will be starting back up again in a couple of weeks and once again, St. Anthony will be participating in the FIRST-Robotics competition. School sports are also already in full swing including boys and girls soccer and cross country. The school will also be participating in their annual Terry Fox Walk on September 30.

"We're looking forward to another great school year and we're excited about what's to come," said Bull.





Fred Fox visits St. Anne

It's been 35 years since Terry Fox embarked on his Marathon of Hope, and brother Fred Fox was in town this week to talk about his legacy and urge others to participate in the annual run that bears his brother's name this weekend at Green Acres Park in Tecumseh.

Thousands of Canadians have heard his message of hope and determination and Monday morning Fox made a stop at St. Anne to personally thank the students and faculty, who have raised thousands of dollars for the cause over the years.

St. Anne's also holds an annual Terry Fox Run separately. This year's event is on September 30.

"The message with Terry is that anything is possible He wasn't the biggest, strongest, even the smartest kid in class," said Fox. "Terry was just like them and was able to accomplish most things that he wanted to based on his work ethic."

Fox shared that Terry was very much a typical high school student before his diagnosis with osteosarcoma at the age of 18. His left leg was amputated three years later.

Even 35 years later, Terry Fox's Marathon of Hope continues to inspire Canadians across the country to raise money for cancer research, something Fox says his family never anticipated.

Fox shares that as Canadians we've all been touched by cancer in one way or another and he believes that's why Terry's legacy has continued the way it has.

"He wanted to make an impact and set an example," said Fox. "But I don't think he would have thought we would still be carrying on his legacy 35 years later."

According to Fox between the Terry Fox Run and the numerous other cancer fundraisers over the years more than 700 million dollars has been raised for cancer research.

When asked about his role to perpetuate Terry's legacy, Fox says he has worked for the foundation for six years and he wears many hats. He travels extensively across the country and says that as Terry's brother he feels the need to share his story. He adds that his brother and sister and their children are also active in bringing Terry's story to Canadians across the country.

After thanking the students and administration for their role and participation, he ended the presentation with a quote from their mother Betty, who passed away four years ago.

"Just like Terry, always set goals and never give up on your dreams," Lakesmore NEWS SEPT 17, 2015
